A Visit from Mount Vernon

The Library has experienced a flurry of media attention since April 17.



It began with this story in the New York Daily News, saying that George Washington never returned two books he borrowed from our Library in 1789, when we shared a building with the new federal government. (Our charging ledger page showing the transaction is above.) As a result of the initial attention, a contact was formed with George Washington's Mount Vernon Estate & Gardens in Virginia. Mount Vernon President James C. Rees graciously offered to replace one of the books, The Law of Nations by Emer de Vattel, with a copy of the same edition.





print, online and television outlets. Despite our best efforts, nearly all the coverage contains at least some misleading or inaccurate information, but the attitude toward both institutions is upbeat and largely appropriate.


Extended Loans for the Summer
